In addition to permanent officials, the European Commission offers non-permanent positions. There are two categories of non-permanent staff:

- [temporary agents](#) are recruited to fill vacant positions for a set amount of time or to perform highly specialised tasks.
- [contract agents](#) may provide additional capacity in specialised fields where an insufficient number of officials is available or carry out a number of administrative or manual tasks. They are generally recruited for fixed-term contracts (maximum 6 years in any EU Institution), but in some cases they can be offered contracts for an indefinite duration (in offices, agencies, delegations or representations).

### WE ARE

As the science and knowledge service of the European Commission, the Joint Research Centre provides independent, evidence-based knowledge and science, supporting EU policies to positively impact society. The current vacancy is in the Directorate for Nuclear Safety and Security (Directorate G). Its mission is the implementation of the JRC Euratom Research and Training Programme, the JRC Nuclear Strategy and the maintenance and dissemination of nuclear competences in Europe to serve both "nuclear" and "non-nuclear" EU Member States. A strong cooperation and complementarity with their national organisations is of key relevance. JRC Directorate G supports the relevant policy DGs with independent, technical and scientific evidence in the areas of nuclear safety, security, safeguards and nuclear science applications. Directorate G also ensures the role of the JRC as an active key partner in nuclear international networks and collaborates with international organisations and prominent Academia and Research Institutes.

The vacancy is within the Unit G.8, Nuclear Safeguards and Security. The mission of the unit is the development of techniques and methodologies to ensure efficient and effective safeguards of nuclear materials, detection of clandestine nuclear activities, and to provide means to detect and combat illicit trafficking. The unit carries out R&D activities in direct scientific and operational support to the European Commission, the EU Member States authorities and the IAEA. It operates on behalf of the Commission the Euratom On-Site Laboratory at the large EU nuclear reprocessing plant at La Hague (France).

The post is located in Karlsruhe (Germany).



## **WE PROPOSE**

---

We propose an exciting position on the topic of nuclear material analysis. The successful candidate will contribute to the implementation of nuclear safeguards by analysing uranium and plutonium samples at the Analytical Service (AS) of the Nuclear Safeguards and Security unit in Karlsruhe, Germany, as well as at the EURATOM on-site laboratory (LSS) in La Hague, France.

The jobholder will perform mass spectrometric analyses of nuclear material using thermal ionisation mass spectrometry (TIMS). This includes sample preparation (dissolution and dilution), instrument operation (calibration and measurement of U and Pu isotopic composition), data evaluation, and quality control activities in accordance with ISO 17025 requirements.

Additional responsibilities are the maintenance and troubleshooting of the instrumentation and the continual improvement of analytical procedures.

In addition to above mentioned work, the position offers frequent travel to the on-site laboratory (LSS) in La Hague, where the successful candidate will carry out nuclear material analyses for safeguards samples. This role provides a unique opportunity to work at the forefront of nuclear safeguard technology in two premier European Commission laboratories.

The JRC is an international organisation offering a multicultural, family-friendly working environment and unique experimental facilities.

## **WE LOOK FOR**

---

We are looking for a highly motivated and adaptable laboratory technician to conduct uranium and plutonium analysis, in particular by applying thermal ionisation mass spectrometry. The successful candidate must have strong teamwork abilities as well as the maturity to work independently.

The candidate should hold a degree or diploma in chemistry, physics or a closely related discipline. Any prior experience in working in a laboratory environment is highly valued and knowledge of mass spectrometric techniques is considered advantageous.

The candidate must be ready to work with weighable amounts of nuclear material and travel up to 12 mission weeks per year.

A good command of English as well as another official EU language is required, and basic knowledge of French is highly desirable.

## ANNEX

### 1. Selection

#### ➤ Am I eligible to apply?

#### **You must meet the following eligibility criteria when you validate your application:**

Our rules provide that you can only be recruited as a temporary agent at the European Commission if you:

#### General criteria:

- Are a citizen of a Member State of the EU and enjoy full rights as a citizen
- Have fulfilled any obligations imposed by applicable laws concerning military service
- Are physically fit to perform the duties linked to the post
- Produce the appropriate character references as to suitability for the performance of the duties.

#### Qualifications:

In order to be recruited for this position, you must have at least

- a level of post-secondary education attested by a diploma, or
- a level of secondary education attested by a diploma giving access to post-secondary education, and appropriate professional experience of at least three years.

Only qualifications issued or recognised as equivalent by EU Member State authorities (e.g. by the Ministry of Education) will be accepted. Furthermore, before recruitment, you will be required to provide the documents that corroborate the eligibility criteria (diplomas, certificates and other supporting documents).

#### Languages:

- have a thorough knowledge (minimum level C1) of one of the 24 official languages of the EU<sup>2</sup>
- AND a satisfactory knowledge (minimum level B2) of a second official language of the EU, to the extent necessary for the performance of the duties.

#### ➤ What about the selection steps?

The post was published internally within the Commission, inter-institutionally, and brought to the attention of competition laureates.

In accordance with Article 29 of the Staff Regulations, applications from Commission officials, officials from other Institutions, and laureates of competitions have priority<sup>3</sup>. If these candidates do not best fit the requirements for the position, the Commission can recruit a temporary agent.

For temporary agents under Article 2(a) of the [Conditions of Employment of Other Servants](#), the post is published directly on the EPSO website, without mandatory prior internal publication.

A selection panel will choose a limited number of candidates for interview, based on the CV and application form that they submitted. Due to the large volume of applications, we may receive, **only candidates selected for the next step of the selection phase will be notified.**

For operational reasons and in order to complete the selection procedure as quickly as possible in the interest of the candidates and of the institution, the selection procedure will be carried out in English and possibly in another language.

## **2. Recruitment**

The candidate selected for recruitment will be requested to supply documentary evidence in support of the statements made in their application.

The successful candidate will be required to undergo a mandatory pre-recruitment medical check-up, carried out by the Commission.

### **➤ Type of contract and working conditions**

The place of employment will be **Karlsruhe**.

In case the successful candidate is not an official or a competition laureate, they will be recruited as a **temporary agent under Article 2(d) of the [Conditions of Employment of Other Servants](#), in function groups AST.**

## ➤ **Grade**

The recruitment grade, as well as the step in that grade, will be determined in accordance with [Commission Decision C\(2025\)4716](#) on policies for the engagement and use of temporary agents and with [Commission Decision C\(2013\)8970](#) laying down the criteria applicable to classification in step on engagement.

The recruitment grade will be calculated based on the qualifications and the number of years of professional experience, according to Art. 13 of the Commission Decision C(2025)4716. Higher grades may be granted exceptionally.

The duration of the **1<sup>st</sup> contract will be up to 4 years**. The contract might then be extended only once for a maximum of 2 years and in the interest of service, in accordance with [Commission Decision C\(2025\)4716](#) on policies for the engagement and use of temporary agents.

All new staff have to successfully complete a 9-month probationary period.

The pay of staff members consists of a basic salary supplemented with specific allowances, including, where applicable, expatriation and family allowances. The provisions guiding the calculation of these allowances can be consulted in the Conditions of Employment of Other Servants. As a member of staff of the European institutions, your pay is subject to a tax raised by those institutions.

The European Commission applies a policy of equal opportunities and non-discrimination in accordance with Article 1d of the Staff Regulations.
